

## Wide Local Excisions

\*\*\*When calling to book this procedure, please let the staff member know that you need a **1 hour appointment** for this. Usually this will be on a Tuesday.\*\*\*\*

What is a wide local excision (WLE)?

- 30-45 minute, in office procedure
- Done with local anesthetic
- Extra skin is taken from all sides around the scar or remaining skin cancer
- Deep dissolvable stitches & top stitches are placed
  - Top stitches need to be removed 15 days later
- If you have multiple skin cancers that need to be excised, only **one** will be done each visit. The others will be done one by one on a different day.

## How do I prepare for the surgery?

- **STOP** the following 3 days prior if you are taking them:
  - Baby Aspirin (if for preventative measures only **if your doctor has advised you to take it for medical reasons, do NOT stop this)**
  - o Over the counter treatments like NSAIDs, natural supplements, garlic, gingko biloba
- If your legs swell, wear over the counter compression stockings daily for at least 1 week prior to reduce swelling as this makes the surgery difficult to do otherwise

## How do I take care of the wound?

- Apply Vaseline daily to wound site
- Apply gauze overtop
- Seal with medical tape
  - Takes 2-6 weeks of daily dressings purchase downstairs in Drug & Bean Pharmacy (\$20 for box of 10 non-adherent PrimaPore gauze bandages)
- Continue with Vaseline or scar gel after suture removal for 1 month
- Note: sometimes "spitting sutures" occur, where the body gets rid of the deep stitches on their own for no particular reason. When this happens, a crusty area starts to appear along the scar line. Don't panic & don't pull it out! This is normal & once the stitch falls out on its own, the scar remains intact afterwards.

How do WLE fit in within my skin cancer management?

- The margins of the extra tissue will be checked to make sure all it is clear we will call you to confirm this with you once the **results return**, which is currently taking 6-8 weeks due to COVID
- Continue regular skin checks with your referring dermatologist, at least once every 6-12 months
